Dear Friends,

Did you know that:

1. The narrow land bridge between Asia and Africa – historical Palestine, today a region divided between Israel and Palestine, is among the most important geographic areas on earth. A link between the earliest civilizations of Mesopotamia (Iraq) and Egypt, it became the highway for conquering armies, a pawn in the power struggle waged for centuries, by the great empires that rose and fell in the Near East. And today it is almost daily in newspaper headlines as rival nations assert their claims to the area.
2. The earliest-known system of writing called “cuneiform”, was invented in Samaria (Southern Iraq) in the third millennium B.C.. A nation of traders, the Sumerians introduced their word symbols throughout the near East, where cuneiform became widely used because it was adaptable to a diversity of languages.
3. “Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.” So said Jesus to Simon Peter and Andrew, his first two disciples. The Sea of Galilee figured prominently in Jesus’ early ministry, to be sure, but no more so that it did in the everyday life of the Holy Land. Fish was a far more important staple food than meat for most of the population, and the sea of Galilee was the principal source, that large lake was productive enough for the surrounding region, but also to support a thriving industry in Capernaum and other shore towns where large quantities of fish were salted and dried for shipment throughout the Roman empire.
